



FIONA STANLEY HOSPITAL PROJECT

When complete in late 2013, the \$1.76 billion Fiona Stanley Hospital at Murdoch will be the major tertiary hospital servicing the south metropolitan area. It will offer comprehensive health care services to communities south of Perth and across the State and, supported by the network of general hospitals in the area, will see more appropriate care provided closer to home. Fiona Stanley Hospital is the centrepiece of the State Government's renewal of the health system and \$5 billion investment in health infrastructure across Western Australia.

Scope

- \$1.76 billion tertiary hospital
- 643 beds (Stage 1)
- 83 per cent single patient rooms
- Gross area (excluding car park) – approx 135,000m²
- 3200 car bays (incl 600 undercover, 750 decked)
- 6300 rooms
- 16 overnight stay wards (of 24 beds each)
- 29 imaging rooms
- 16 theatres



Key services

- Tertiary medical and surgical services
- Major centre for trauma, burns, heart and lung transplants
- Cancer services
- Paediatric services
- Radiology services
- Renal transplantation and dialysis
- Collocated with new research facility
- Links to St John of God Hospital, a new medical centre, consulting rooms, a medi-hotel and local education providers

The site

Fiona Stanley Hospital will be located adjacent to:

- a major private hospital, the St John of God Hospital
- a leading tertiary institution, Murdoch University
- the Challenger TAFE Murdoch campus
- a world-class medical research facility to be built on the site by the Western Australian Institute for Medical Research

The collocation of Fiona Stanley Hospital and St John of God Hospital will encourage potential partnerships between the private and public health systems and pave the way for the sharing of facilities, services and staff.

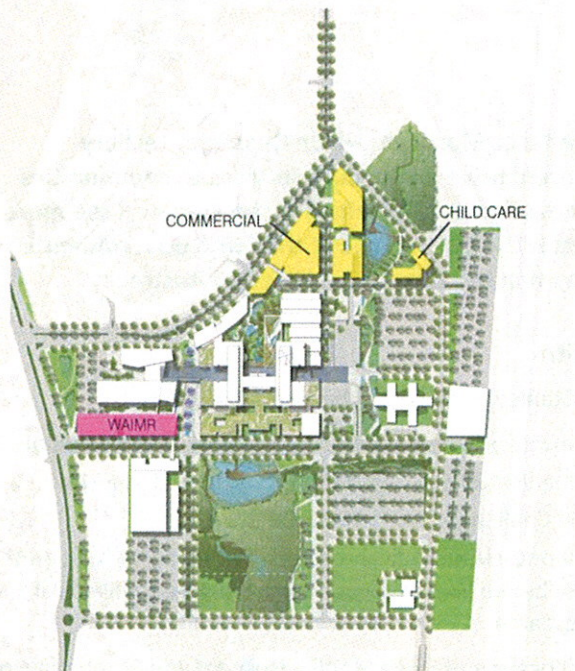
Nearby education providers, including Murdoch University and Challenger TAFE, will also provide future partnership opportunities. Fiona Stanley Hospital will also be ideally positioned to offer excellent training opportunities for medical, nursing and allied health students and those in other health related fields.

The planned health precinct will also include clinical accommodation and consulting suites, and short-term accommodation to support friends and relatives of patients using the Fiona Stanley Hospital and other facilities in the area.

The site is located approximately four kilometres from Jandakot Airport, providing quick access for the Royal Flying Doctor Service for rural transfers and trauma cases.

Building the local community

The availability of undeveloped land between the Fiona Stanley Hospital site and Murdoch station offers the opportunity for a well designed, located and connected local area with excellent access and public transport options.

Fiona Stanley Hospital will be the catalyst for local and regional growth and development and will generate economic investment and local employment opportunities.

It will also drive private and commercial developments including retail outlets, cafes and other recreational facilities.

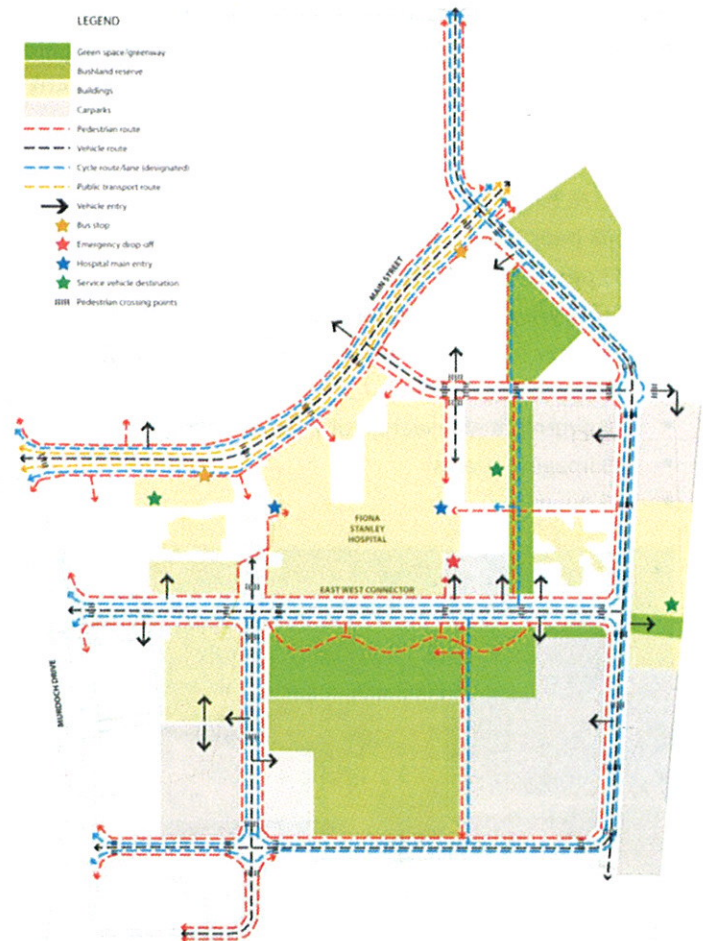
Fiona Stanley Hospital and other developments in the area will breathe new life into the Murdoch region and create a safer and more secure local area. Planned and future development will see more people on site around the clock and year-round, allowing for passive surveillance of the local area and minimising the opportunity for antisocial behaviour.

Promoting sustainable transport

The design and location of Fiona Stanley Hospital will encourage the use of sustainable transport alternatives – including public transport, walking and cycling.

Located less than a kilometre from the Murdoch bus/rail interchange, the hospital will be only a short walk from train services and will have direct access to regular bus services. This will reduce the reliance on private vehicles, promote walking and cycling, allow improvement to services through increased patronage, and provide more choices for the local community.

Urban design in the local area will benefit transit users, cyclists and pedestrians. Bus services will travel in dedicated bus priority lanes, on 'Main Street', the road which will pass by the hospital and link the train station to Murdoch Drive. Walking or cycling between Murdoch station and the hospital will also be easy and safe, with good design for street gradients, dedicated cycle lanes, pedestrian ramps, street finishes, and shading.
